ZOOM IN ON CRIME

Have you ever wondered how doctors help investigators solve crime? Previously, medical professionals meticulously used normal cameras, their own powers of observation, and took notes to document what happened to a victim. This has been an invasive process with many limitations. For instance, detecting small details can be difficult and collecting specimens within the patient's personal space is time consuming and unpleasant for the patients.

Less than a month ago, the naval hospital in Yokosuka, Japan received a cutting-edge system to greatly assist forensic medical examinations. The Cortexflo 4k/8k Canon forensic camera system allows doctors to see four to eight times more detail than the naked eye.

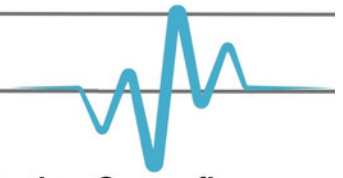

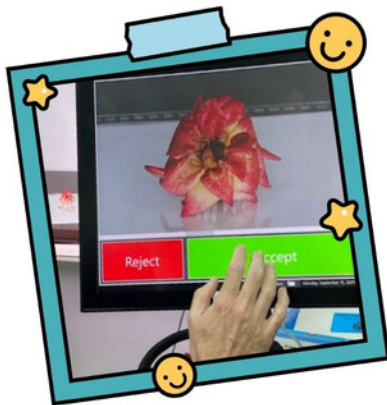
It can zoom incredibly close and measure areas with injuries. Through AI, shadows are removed and pictures become clearer. By changing the light spectrum, bruises and other injuries, which may not be visible yet, really pop out.

Medical Technology



The base hospital in Japan frequently uses the Cortexflo Camera in cases of suspected assault or abuse. It also has general medical usages, too. Doctors can utilize the camera's magnification to monitor healing, benefitting many health conditions.

MEDICAL FORENSICS...

is the application of medical science in solving crime. If you enjoy crime TV, you've watched how investigators collect tiny specimens to crack a case. Like on TV, the Cortexflo system can document trace amounts of liquids, bruising, burns, lacerations, hair, or fiber. When documenting recurring patterns, it can help determine if someone is a victim, even if they say their injuries happened “by accident.”

PRECISION VIEW

The Cortexflo system has already improved forensic and general medical capabilities for Yokosuka Naval Hospital. It has the potential to be a great help to doctors, investigators, and victims alike. If you are in the base hospital receiving care for a condition needing advanced documentation, you might see the Cortexflo in action.

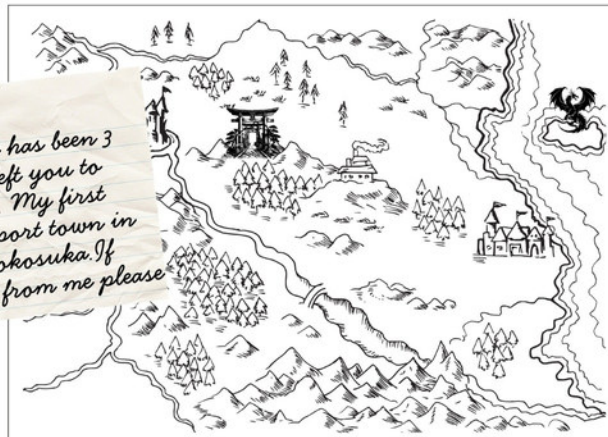


When Gozuryu eventually died, he turned himself into a hill in Koshigoe to forever protect the maiden and the people of Enoshima.

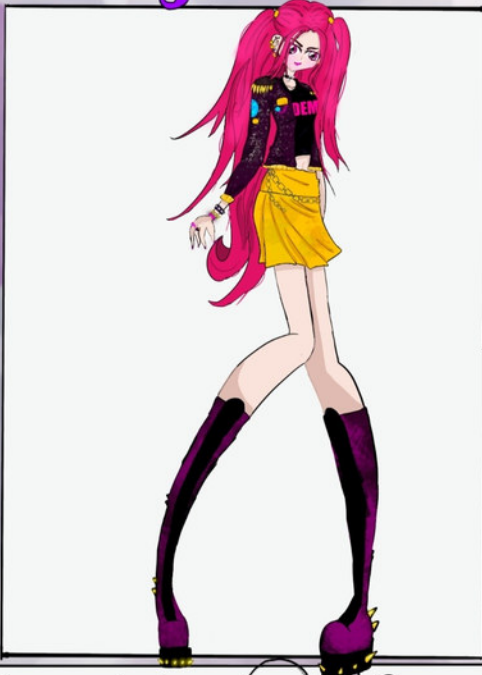

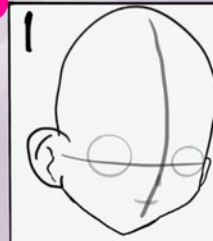

3 Once you've drawn the legs don't forget to add hands and feet.

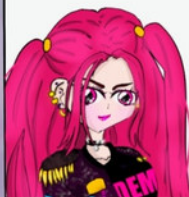


4 Next up is drawing the clothes! Totally golden. Don't forget to add like a lot of spikes and chains and sparkles!

7 Next we totally need to add some eyes so that you're drawing doesn't look like a faceless demon!



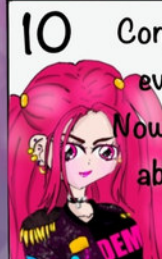
8 When drawing the eyes, be careful not to draw them too close together or it might totally look a little weird.

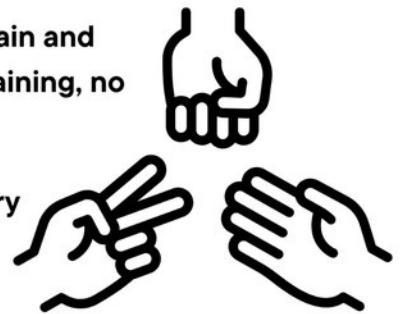
SAKKĀ, SOCCER, AND FÚTBUL

My name is Sol and I am a Mexican American living in Japan and **THIS IS MY STORY.**

I've been **KICKING** my love of soccer around from America to Spain and now to Japan. This has given me the drive to work hard in soccer training, no matter what country I am in.



The first few months in Japan were very difficult. The drills given by the coach were impossible for me to understand because of the language barrier. TEAM EXPECTATIONS

Uniform expectations were high and so was being on time. For example, you are required to have separate indoor soccer shoes that you are not allowed to use outdoors. This I understand because of their culture, they take their shoes off at the front door, so it makes sense that they do the same for soccer. Japan also has numerous uniforms- sometimes I think too many. American and Spanish teams had expectations too, but not as strict as Japan. So far, I haven't noticed any casual teams. I have tried out for six teams and have played on three.

So, I made sure to always be on time. Japanese players were in charge of getting themselves to **PRACTICE**. *Fun Fact:* Japanese kids usually travel by taking a bike or the train on their own. My parent's drove me to every practice and stuck around until practice was over.

One big part of soccer is being a part of the team and knowing your coaches and teammates well. Since I didn't know the language, all I could do was stand close, nod along when the team had down time and talked to each other. Although these animals were being well taken care of, a big city is not their natural habitat. For example, hedgehogs are normally in cold temperatures and live in parts of Europe, Africa, and Asia. I am not sure they love living in a cafe, it seems very different than being out in nature.





Autumn Vibes and Dragonfly Lives

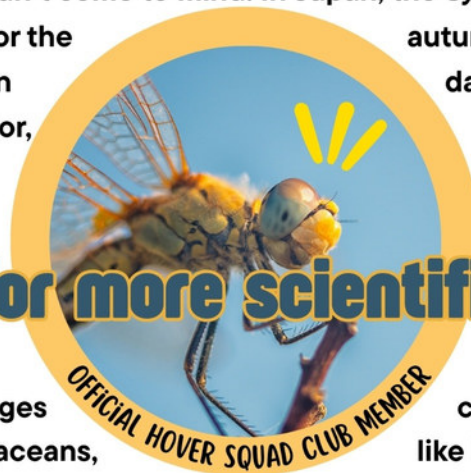

What reminds you of autumn - apple picking, leaves falling, or pumpkin spice everything? I bet dragonflies didn't come to mind. In Japan, the *Sympetrum frequens*, which is the super scientific name for the autumn darter, lets us know that autumn has started. The autumn darter very much represents autumn because it changes color, like leaves do at this time of year. Male autumn darters change from yellow to red as they mature.

Ready for more scientific words?

The autumn darter changes pigments found in crustaceans, color because of ommochromes-like lobsters, crabs, and insects. Then, a chemical reaction called oxidation-reduction or **REDOX** changes the dragonfly from yellow to red! The autumn darter migrates high into the mountains after its nymph phase. It remains in the mountains until it returns to breeding pools, including rice fields at lower elevations.

Sadly, the use of pesticides has affected many insect populations in Japan by preventing emergence, feeding and growing.






Animals

The autumn darter is affectionately known as “aka tombo” in Japan. “Aka ”means red, and “tombo” is short for “tombogaeri”, which means aerial somersault. Dragonflies can turn quickly in the air and even fly backwards! Japanese culture values insects, especially tombos because the old Japanese name for dragonfly is “katsumushi”, which means **VICTORY INSECT!**

Tombos earned this title for their skill in quickly killing enemies and other insects without fear, they were also a symbol for **SAMURAI WARRIORS.**

Even today, many companies use the tombo as part of their branding, such as the Tombow Pencil Company. 

There are two reasons why kids, like myself, would appreciate learning about this dragonfly. The first is that it might remind you of a particular Pokémon - can you guess which one?

The second reason is that the autumn darter is a rare sighting; it's like a **TREASURE TO FIND** for kids who love to go bug hunting.

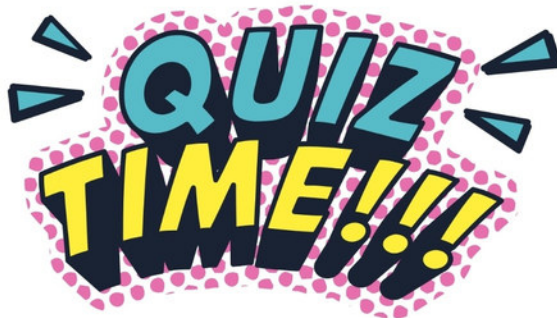

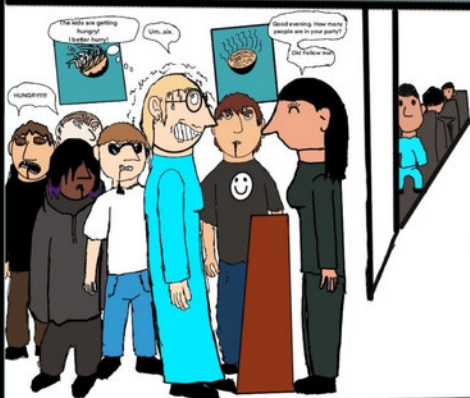

It is now the class's lunch time and the teacher decides to go to a ramen restaurant - the teacher will have to be quick before they eat the furniture and not the food.

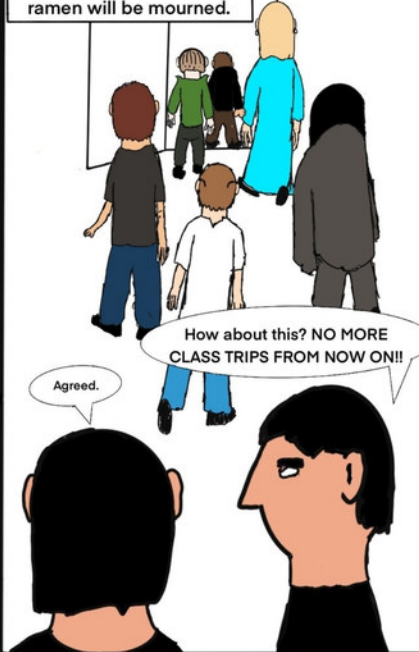


Now seated and ordering, Melvin is translating everything but the menu.

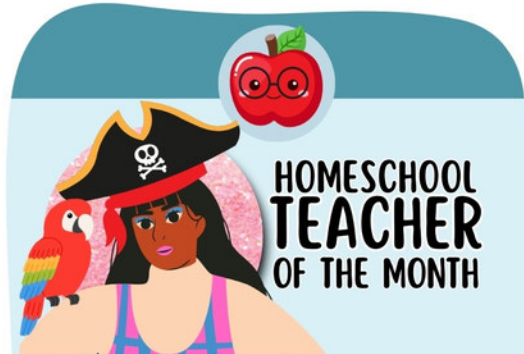
